

Dr. Bridie Mulholland: I am at the beginning of my career, having finished up my PhD in July of 2021. I am currently based in the Australian Health Services Research Institute at the University of Wollongong. During my PhD I was involved in basic bone biology research, but I have since made a leap over to clinical research. I now work on large population based studies (think big data) that aim to improve health outcomes and inform health service planning - I focus on how bone health is managed in the healthcare system. ECIC's are such a critical tool in developing the skills of ECIs and are especially important as we emerge form the COVID-19 pandemic. As an ECI myself, I am passionate about ensuring ECIs have the necessary tools to excel in their careers - being part of the ECIC allows me to stay engaged with other ECIs, and improve and expand the support available to them.

Dr. Pamela Rufus-Membere: I am a postdoctoral research fellow at the Institute for Mental and Physical Health and Clinical Translation, Deakin University. I am an emerging leader in the field of osteoporosis assessment and fracture prevention. Specifically, I am part of a team pioneering the sub-field of bone impact microindentiation technology in Australia. My goal is to augment my research capacity through gaining more knowledge, training and expanding my resource base. Being a part of the ECI Committee gives me an opportunity to work closely with a team which informs and supports research development in early career researchers, while also contributing my knowledge and expertise to the collective goals of the ECIC. Further, networks thus forged may create exciting opportunities for future collaborations to answer bigger research questions, which could ultimately progress the field.

My research is focused on optimising the management of osteoporosis in younger adults. Using a bench-to-bedside approach, the long-term goal of my project is to improve the management of osteoporosis over a lifetime. Our lab at the Garvan Institute of Medical Research have recently uncovered a novel process via which osteoclasts 'recycle' and with this knowledge, I am looking at how osteoclasts behave under the influence of different osteoporosis therapies.

What was your highlight of the ANZBMS ASM in 2021?

Having a joint meeting with the Endocrine Society of Australia for the 2021 Annual Scientific Meeting meant that I was able to indulge my clinical interests in Endocrinology and learn so much about the amazing musculoskeletal research happening around Australia and New Zealand. What are your goals for the future?



I want to present at international conferences IN PERSON and finish all my experiments for my PhD in 2022!


