PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I would like to start my first report to the Society by personally thanking the outstanding work of Jill Cornish as the immediate past President and those Members of the outgoing council, in particular Geoff Nicholson and David Findlay, for their work over the last two years which has the left the Society in such a strong position both scientifically and financially. In the past two years we have had two very successful scientific meetings, the 2006 meeting at Port Douglas and the recent meeting at Rydges Lakeland Resort in Queenstown which have attracted very positive comments about the excellence of the scientific content, which reflects a vibrant society and a skilful POC, lead by Ego Seeman and Matthew Gillespie, as well as a very efficient LOC. In this regard I would particularly like to thank the contributions of Karen Callon, Maureen Watson, Usha Bava, Brya Matthews and Rene van Rijn for the Oueenstown meeting. This was always going to be a hard act to follow after the meeting at Port Douglas, but they did an outstanding job.

So what does the Society have planned for 2008 to 2009? New Members on Council include Tim Cundy, Mark Kotowicz and Nick Fazzalari who I am sure will continue to build on the great work of their predecessors. Mark Kotowicz will take on Chairmanship of the Professional Affairs Sub-Committee and Nick Fazzalari will become the Newsletter editor. A number of new initiatives will commence in 2008 including the Registrars Weekend to be held in Melbourne, sponsored by Amgen on this occasion although for future meetings, other companies may also be involved in its support. Our web site has been greatly enhanced given the efforts put in by Rene van Rijn prior to the Queenstown meeting and our new logos and these web initiatives are now owned by the Society and will continue to give us a professional and effective 'web face' to our members and other parties contacting us on line. We have built strong links with Osteoporosis Australia and with the election of Rebecca Mason as President Elect, there are now two members of Council currently on the Osteoporosis Australia Board as well as a former President, namely Peter Ebeling who has taken over as Medical Director of Osteoporosis Australia. One of the initiatives we commenced last year was the employment of a fundraiser, Maria Chilcott, by Osteoporosis Australia to raise funds for the ANZMBS - Osteoporosis Australia Research Fund. The current balance of this fund is over half a million dollars but we want to increase this to over a million dollars in the next few years. The initial employment of Maria was from monies residing in the NOCA account which supported her in the first year. Council has agreed to support her for a further twelve months and possibly thereafter, subject to review and performance. However, I am pleased to report that there has been an excellent outcome in the first twelve months with the achievement of the Macquarie Bank Fellowship, as well as grants from Myer, the Wicking Trust, Trust Co Scholarships and a whole range of other initiatives.

Another major initiative that has commenced in the last twelve months and which we want to continue is that musculoskeletal disorders now have their own Grant Review Panel at the NHMRC. I would like to particularly thank Matthew Gillespie, Graeme Jones, Peter Ebeling, John Eisman and Lyn March for their work in pushing this issue with the NHMRC and to Warwick Anderson for allowing this to proceed. For 2008, the success rate for Bone and Joint Grants was on par with other specialties, at above 25% which is well up form the 16% rate last year.

2008 will see the Annual Scientific Meeting held in Melbourne from 28th to 31st August and at this stage the program looks most interesting with invited speakers likely Mitch Schaffler and John Bilezikian. There will be a combined day with the Endocrine Society of Australia. We hope to continue a close alliance with Japanese bone researchers by having a 'Pacific Rim' symposium with up

to six Japanese invited speakers attending and presenting. The venue will be the Hilton on the Park. There will also be an Australian Health and Medical Congress Meeting held in Brisbane in 2008, for which Peter Nash is co-ordinating the speakers for ANZBMS.

The 2009 Meeting, will follow relatively shortly afterwards, in Sydney, and will be a combined meeting of ANZBMS and IBMS. John Eisman is the Chairman of the LOC and other members representing ANZBMS include myself, Rebecca Mason and Matthew Gillespie. This will be held at the Sydney Convention Centre and a very large attendance seems likely. Satellite meetings planned include the Cancer and Bone Society, Comparative Endocrinology and Densitometry as well as possibly Paget's disease and Paediatric bone disease. One of the biggest problems facing our Society is that although we have a number of excellent young basic scientists coming through, there is deficiency of young Clinical Physician trainees in the bone field. Although we have some initiatives with Osteoporosis Australia to advertise scholarships for training via the RACP, this is an ongoing issue we need to address as clearly the financial basis of our society depends upon a strong balance between clinical and basic science.

Finally, the Society now has a healthy bank balance and is in a position to place some of its funds at a higher interest rate to further grow our financial 'back bone' and make us less dependent upon the registration of new drugs and sponsorship support for our scientific meetings and Council have agreed to this.

PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As I come to the conclusion of my Presidency, I'm delighted to report on the progress we have made throughout this time.

Firstly, last year we established **joint research fund initiatives with Osteoporosis Australia** (OA), in an effort to take support for bone research in Australia and NZ to a new level. Judy Stenmark, CEO of OA, continues to be the driving force behind this joint venture. We are most grateful for her hard work. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed and to show support for this initiative, ANZBMS agreed to support the salary of the new OA fundraiser, Maria Chilcott, with a one off grant of \$60K. Maria has been successful in securing a:

- 1. Macquarie Bank Fellowship for 3 years (2007 was yr 1)
- 2. Myer Foundation Scholarship for at least 2 years (yr 1 will be 2008)

Secondly, we are now **realising the Strategic Plan for the Society** which we established over the last two years. Matthew Gillespie has been the driving force behind this initiative, which we have really appreciated. Thirdly, I am very pleased to report on the huge success of the **ANZBMS Densitometry Courses** to which Roger Price, Nick Pocock and Chris Schultz continue dedicating an amazing amount of energy to run, and the courses are now an established feature of the Society. Because of the reputation of the course, this has now become well supported and a revenue generator for our Society.

The **Society Membership** has grown from 64 members in 1992, to 526 members in 2007. This year a questionnaire has been established to enable feedback from the Annual Scientific Meetings, and we urge you to complete one of these at the conclusion of the Queenstown meeting. This will assist us to design future meetings in accordance with our members' needs – it is thus an opportunity for your voice to be heard.

Our Society has become more closely aligned with other international bodies, including the International Bone and Mineral Society (the current President,

Ian Reid, being one of us) and the American Society of Bone and Mineral Research as well as the Japanese Society of Bone and Mineral Reseach with whom we initiated closer ties at last year's Port Douglas meeting. **In 2009, ANZBMS are combining with the IBMS** for a joint meeting in Darling Harbour, Sydney.

During my two years as President, I have been assisted tremendously by the members of an excellent **Council** for which I am very grateful. I have huge trust in the members of Council and thus have continued to confidently delegate many matters. I would particularly like to acknowledge the two retiring members of Council for their enthusiastic and successful efforts whilst on Council:

- Geoffrey Nicholson, who has contributed enormously in many areas of Council, but particularly as Chair of the Medical Affairs Committee.
- David Findlay, the current Honorary Secretary, who has also taken on the important role of representing our interests in Medical Research - a role he has carried out superbly. In the last six months he has also temporarily taken on the Treasurer's responsibilities.

The other members remaining on Council to continue their good work are Philip Sambrook, Roger Price, Rebecca Mason, Matthew Gillespie and Peter Nash. The Council works very well together and we are fortunate to have superb clinical and basic research expertise on the Council enabling the Society to function effectively. Our Society would not enjoy its successes and smooth organisational operation without the efficient and diligent work of Ivone Johnson, our Secretariat. As I move on from my role as President, I am extremely confident that Council will continue to provide our Society with excellent wisdom and support, under the Presidency of Philip Sambrook. I am delighted to announce that the new President-Elect is Rebecca Mason and Honorary Secretary is Matthew Gillespie. Roger Price fortunately resumes his Honorary Treasurer role after his brief absence.

Thanks also to Michael Hooper for his ongoing representation on behalf of the ANZBMS on the Specialty Board for the RACP. We are very fortunate to have him continuing on this Board.

This Queenstown meeting has been wonderfully supported with over 250 delegates from 9 different countries.

2007 ANNUAL SCIENTIFIC MEETING

The 17th ANZBMS Annual Scientific Meeting was held at Rydges Lakeside Resort 9th - 12th September 2007. This meeting was scheduled in New Zealand immediately prior to the ASBMR meeting in Hawaii with the view to minimize travel expenses and time commitments for delegate who wished to attend the two meetings. The attendance indicated that this was a successful approach with over 260 registrants, and this coupled with the scientific program, locality and support and catering at the meeting made this an incredibly enjoyable meeting.

We are grateful to our many invited speakers, but in particular to Professor Sevgi Rodan, Professor Nicola Partridge and Professor Steven Cummings, for travelling to New Zealand and for participating in the meeting in multiple ways. The excellence of their contributions has added significantly to the scientific standard of the meeting, enhancing its breadth of interest and educational value. It was also pleasing to note their attendance throughout the meeting, the questions and engagement of voung investigators at the meeting. This is something that we aspire to achieve, and it is so reassuring to witness this each year.

In order to maximise the program and audience participation only one concurrent session was programed with the majority of the 31 short oral presentations being incorporated into sessions with the 24 invited plenary presentations. Particular emphasis was given to sessions on fractures and absolute risk as well as arthritis and gout, areas that have not been traditionally covered during previous meetings.

THERAPEUTICS Committee

This Committee has had a busy period with issues like osteonecrosis of the jaw and the availability of new treatments and indications. ANZBMS took a pro-active position with bodies like the PBAC that we should be the source of professional advice about bone related medications. In January our advice was sought by the PBAC about proposed changes to the availability of osteoporosis medications that would require a BMD measurement with a T score below -2.5 as well a low trauma fracture before prescription of medication is subsidised. In conjunction with Osteoporosis Australia we prepared a joint submission which argued there should be no change to the current requirements. We also approached Professsor Goss in Adelaide who agreed Peter Ebeling could do an independent audit of ONJ cases identified in their recent postal survey of oral surgeons. We continue to provide advice to Lilly about potential listing on the PBAC of teraparatide and have had discussions with the NPS about new practice documents for osteoporosis treatment.

NEW NHMRC Fellowship schemes

The NHMRC has introduced two schemes that may be beneficial to the members of the Society. The first is the Australian Fellowship that was announced in the 2006 Federal Budget and provides new funds to attract and retain leading researchers. The purpose of the scheme is to provide support for the most outstanding health and/or medical researchers both nationally and/or internationally to support outstanding research teams in Australia, to undertake research that is of major importance in its field and of significant benefit to Australian health and medical research. Thus, we should be aware of the Australian Fellowship for any individuals that you wish to attract to Australia.

The second scheme recently announced is a Fellowship Exchange Program involving Australia and China that will commence in January 2008. This may be an appropriate vehicle for bilateral exchange of post-doctoral fellows, and you should highlight your intention to be involved in this scheme with your Research Office Administrator.
